| Introduction  |
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| <p>This is a two-semester course. The first semester is more theoretical-oriented, introducing the internal structures of English sounds, words, phrases, sentence and meanings. The second semester then starts to introduce applied linguistics, including pragmatics, first-language acquisition, second-lagnauge acquistion, lagnuage variation, neurolinguistics etc.</p> <p>The goal of the course in the first semester is to porvide the basic knowledge of subcategories of linguistics such as phonology, syntax, semestics, morphology, pragmatics of linguistics. After completing this course, students will have the basic idea how the sounds, words, sentences and meanings of English are organized.</p> |

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| <p>The background knowledge of Linguistics will be introduced in the first two weeks, and then the course moves into each sub-subject such as phonology, morphology, syntax and semantics. The range of miid-term exam may include phonetic, phonology and morphology. Final exam then will include the content of syntax and semantics.
